Our Foundation

Through our Foundation's philanthropy, we work to advance the dignity, rights, and empowerment of people living in poverty and marginalization in Canada and globally. We believe in excellence, in our collaboration and partnerships, and in supporting the leadership of communities and their organizations in their pursuit of positive social change.

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The Pathy Family Foundation's offices are located on the unceded territory of the Kanien'kehá:ka people (Keepers of the Eastern Door) on the island known as Tio'tia:ke (Montreal).

Interview with our President and Chairman | Past and Present

In June 2023, leadership of the Pathy Family Foundation Board of Directors transitioned from founding President Laurence Pathy to Mark Pathy, PFF's new Chairman. We sat down with the two leaders to reflect on the past 15 years and what lies ahead for the Foundation.

What inspired you to create the Pathy Family Foundation?

Laurence Pathy: As a family, we've been very fortunate and care deeply about social issues, so it seemed like the logical and important thing to do to try to give back, help, and make a difference. In my mind, and certainly for others in the family, it was also a



chance for the family to come together and create something meaningful together.

What are you most looking forward to as you step into this role?

Mark Pathy: While I look forward to continuing PFF's strong trajectory of learning and growth that we're all very proud of, I am also bringing my own skills, personal experiences, and style to the table. I intend to apply these to inspire and engage our new management team, my fellow Board members, and of course our existing and potential partners - locally and internationally. I'd like to see us drive long-term, sustainable, and measurable impact, and build leadership through collaboration.

What do you feel are PFF's defining values or traits as a grantmaker?

Laurence Pathy:

Responsibility, integrity, a commitment to excellence, to learning, and to leadership. I would also say compassion and caring for the plight of others. The family shares these values and I think they inform how we as a Foundation interact with our partners and collaborators.

What do you see as some of the biggest challenges or goals facing PFF and our sector?

Mark Pathy: We live in a dynamic, changing world with a growing number of people in immediate crisis, and many others facing limited access to basic needs as well as obstacles to economic independence. While this

is not new, it does seem to be getting more difficult to identify the best strategies to both meet immediate needs and to give others a helping hand towards control of their own destiny. With our qualified team and our philosophy of longterm funding and flexible, collaborative support, I feel PFF is well-positioned to deal effectively with these ongoing challenges.

What are you particularly proud of when you look back at 15 years of PFF?

of the impacts we've had working with many different causes, organizations, and leaders over the years. It's been rewarding to see how the Foundation has helped them accomplish their goals. The family involvement is also very important and exciting to see, especially as it becomes multi-generational with the grandchildren starting to become involved.

The opportunities to visit partners in Montreal and on other site visits have been highlights - being able to see the work in action - and I think it's something we should do much more of in the future. Personally, I am also proud of the Pathy Foundation Fellowship program and the impacts the young leaders have had in their communities.


Where do you see PFF in 5 years?



Future Proofing Ilisaqsivik

River, Nunavut, that has been providing services by and for the community for 25 years. It is a key pillar of support, offering counselling services, land-based programming, education, and employment programs rooted in Inuit culture and delivered in Inuktitut. Ilisaqsivik was founded by community members and is led by an Inuit Board and staff. It strives to have Inuit staff across all leadership positions and aims to become a model for a fully Inuit-led organization.

PFF's grant supports its three-year strategy to ensure the resilience and sustainability of this model.

First Nations Executive Education

The First Nations Executive Education (FNEE) is a school created by and for First Nations. FNEE has a unique approach, where courses are co-created and co-dispensed in pairs by Indigenous academics and professionals who work in collaboration with Hautes Études Commerciales (HEC) faculty professors. This approach ensures that Indigenous experiences and ancient knowledge are meshed with cutting-edge leadership skills and practices, resulting in teachings that are directly transferable to First Nations realities.

PFF's grant supports the FNEE's ultimate objective of First Nations communities' social and economic prosperity.

For a Generation of Nurturing, Equitable and Non-Violent Boys

Equimundo: Center for Masculinities and Social Justice works towards long-term, sustainable change to promote gender equality and create a world free from violence. They do this by engaging men and boys in partnership with women, girls, and individuals of all gender identities. Their work emerges from more than two decades of local and international research, which informs their program development and advocacy.

PFF's grant supports Equimundo's Global Boyhood Initiative (GBI) in Latin America, initially focusing on Bolivia and Mexico, where they are developing a GBI curriculum for schools and teacher training modules in collaboration with local partners.

We look forward to continuing our work in 2024 and directly reaching teachers, parents and boys and girls."

Perinatal Care for Black and Racialized Mothers

Mino Care (formerly Mommy Monitor) is a holistic virtual perinatal health care centre. They offer access to a range of customized, culturally safe healthcare services and supports to navigate reproductive and perinatal health. They provide wraparound services to hospitals, community health centres, and midwifery clinics to serve Black parents, filling the gap in reproductive, prenatal, and postpartum care for Black women, pregnant persons, and their families in Canada.

PFF's grant supports Mino Care's mission to create conditions for less stressful, safer, and happier pregnancies, which will reduce health risks and complications that disproportionately threaten racialized birthing persons and babies.

Essential Goods Redistribution Program

Welcome Collective's Essential Goods Redistribution Program provides refugee claimant families in Montreal with furniture and essential items upon arrival, while keeping gently used household goods out of landfills.

Using a revenue-generating social enterprise model, the program helps fund its operations through donor pick-up fees and is always free of charge for refugee claimant families.

PFF's grant supports Welcome Collective to serve more refugee claimant families, provide additional job and volunteer opportunities for newcomers, invest in environmentally friendly practices, and develop capacity-building tools to share with other organizations.

Young Women Agriculture Guides Educating the Way to Climate Resiliency in Rural Zimbabwe

CAMFED is a pan-African, grassroots-led movement tackling poverty, inequality, and injustice through girls' education and women's leadership. Their model radically improves girls' prospects of becoming independent, influential women.

PFF's grant supports the Agriculture Guides program in Zimbabwe, where young women from underserved farming districts are trained as Agriculture Guides. They introduce climate change education in schools and share climate-smart agricultural practices with female farmers in rural communities. Ultimately, the program seeks to strengthen community resilience to climate change, reduce its impact on education and help girls stay in school.

Peer-to-Peer Learning Initiative | Gathering of Minds

In October 2023, nearly 30 staff from the Pathy Family Foundation's Indigenous-led and Indigenous-serving partner organizations came together for our 2nd annual Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Learning Gathering, held this year in Winnipeg and graciously co-hosted by our local partner, Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Centre.

P2P is an initiative launched by PFF in 2019 to strengthen our partners' work through peer learning, exchanging best practices, and providing support to each other in a brave space.

The three days at Ma Mawi Chi Itata Centre were rich with exchange, learning, and exploring opportunities for collaboration. Through a series of workshops and group sessions on a variety of participant-driven topics, the group built and strengthened relationships, expanded their resource networks, and gained a better understanding of different issues. The gathering also provided a space for rest, Indigenous healing and selfcare services, connection with nature, and peer support. The momentum from the in-person gathering continues year-round through quarterly virtual sessions.

The learning goes beyond the partner networks - the PFF team is deeply grateful to our participating partner organizations for their generosity and trust in this process and for sharing openly with us the challenges encountered on the frontline and how funding practices can support organizations in addressing them. We are committed to implementing our learnings and our partners' feedback to further refine and adapt our grantmaking to their needs and realities.

Finally, we would like to sincerely thank the team and Knowledge Keepers at Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Centre, who warmly welcomed us into their beautiful spaces and generously shared their local cultural and healing resources with participants.
